OUR HISTORY

Te Omanga Hospice began providing services to the Hutt Valley Community on the 6th of September 1979. It was the first home-based hospice service in New Zealand to provide a programme of total care and to offer a comprehensive education programme. The service was the vision of Marion Cooper, supported by her husband Max, and Sir Roy McKenzie and Shirley, Lady McKenzie. Together they founded Te Omanga Hospice to provide care and support to people diagnosed with terminal cancer who wished to be cared for at home until they died. The vision has expanded to include all people living with a terminal illness, whether it be cancer or non-cancer.

Everyone with palliative needs in our community receives responsive, proactive and equitable care.

- To provide expert and compassionate palliative support, information and advice to patients and whānau living in the Hutt Valley
- To work collaboratively with all health and social care providers to ensure as many people as possible benefit from our expertise through education
- To improve communities' understanding and acceptance of death and dying

- To be true to our values as a good employer
- To be good stewards of resources

OUR PROGRAMME OF CARE

Te Omanga Hospice provides palliative care through an interdisciplinary team of specialist doctors, nurses, therapists and specially trained volunteers to those living with a terminal or life limiting illness in the Hutt Valley. We also support the delivery of palliative care in Residential Care Facilities, the Hutt Hospital and in conjunction with General Practitioners.

KAREN'S STORY

"My Mum is a real inspiration to us. Even when she had been diagnosed with stage four breast and lung cancer, she didn't moan about it, sometimes she shed a few tears but then made sure she lived every day to the max. Te Omanga Hospice helped her do this. Whenever we stayed at the hospice we enjoyed the sanctuary it provided to our family, it was so lovely and peaceful. It is the personal touches of the staff and volunteers that really made the difference. The delicious home cooked meals and the beautiful serene garden we so enjoyed. JIM'S STORY

"For years I managed the Bellevue Hotel next door to the hospice. We were very good neighbours. Now I know my days on earth are numbered, I have once again welcomed Te Omanga into my life. Twice a week the music therapist from Te Omanga comes and helps me record my favourite songs and words for my grandchildren. It is really important to me that I leave them a special memento of me, my love of music, some special messages and especially, just the sound of my voice. 
MARION & BRIAN'S STORY

"One day Marion mentioned her back was sore and we just thought she had strained it lifting one of our grandchildren. While on holiday Marion's condition deteriorated rapidly, and on our return she was diagnosed with myeloma and put into the care of Te Omanga Hospice. For us, it is the care, security and comfort of knowing they are always available to help. Some things like getting information from doctors and organising prescriptions, just happen. We required a lot of equipment to ensure Marion continued to live with as much independence as possible. Everything we needed was given to us."



TONY'S STORY

"I used to be a construction worker and often saw people in wheelchairs and wondered how they coped. I didn't realise the pain I had been suffering was the start of me being in the same situation. After many scans and x-rays I found out I had cancer in the bone of my left leg. The cancer moved to my spine and other parts of my body. My oncologist admitted me into the care of Te Omanga Hospice. It was reassuring to me and my family that they understood the pain I was going through and how to manage it. There was no shortage of help there for us; we were so impressed by the passion and dedication of the team there, they would do anything to help us."

REBUILDING OUR HOSPICE



The rebuild of our new purpose-built hospice began this year with the demolition of our earthquake-prone building at Woburn Road. We've watched as the new hospice has risen from the rubble to resemble what will be a magnificent haven for the Hutt Valley community.

The new hospice, scheduled to be completed early next year, will have eight patient rooms, improved facilities, modern equipment, and be energy efficient and sustainable. It will also be a safer home for everyone - patients and their families, visitors, staff and volunteers.

We appreciate the generosity of those who have already supported our campaign to raise \$10 million to rebuild our hospice. We are 75% of the way there with \$2.5 million left to raise.

PALLIATIVE CARE IS EVERYONE'S BUSINESS



Te Omanga has continued to offer an education programme through the temporary move of our hospice to Petone. Working more closely with the Petone community has been an added bonus and the benefits reflect our heading that 'Palliative Care is everyone's business'.

Most of our educational courses have been held at the Petone Community House where we have built strong connections. We moved our well-resourced library from Woburn Road to Petone Library during the year, making our books and journals more visible and accessible to people. We also have a notice board there with a monthly focus.

This year our focus has been on increasing community involvement in palliative care, from our ongoing courses for family carers to our newly formed course for patients called 'Where the Landscape Lies'. Our aim is for patients and families to be empowered so their end-of-life experiences are as meaningful as possible and form powerful memories for families to carry on with. Raising palliative care awareness is a high priority, starting with encouraging our Te Omanga Clinical Team to keep up-skilled in their core work, while holding on to the holistic skills that define our work.

We are working hard to grow our Palliative Care Link Nurse (PCLN) programme, which offers registered primary nurses an opportunity to develop their generalist palliative skills. This enables them to act as a link between their organisation and Te Omanga. We now have 20 Link Nurse working in the Hutt Valley and we are proud of their efforts as they move palliative care forward.

Our desire for the future is that the Hutt Valley becomes a compassionate city in palliative care. A city where people know and understand palliative care, and the knowledge, fear and uncertainty around death fades; A city in which people have conversations about death, dying and grief, and come together to support each other at the end of life.

A PARTNERSHIP IN RESIDENTIAL AGED CARE

Te Omanga's Aged Care Team aims to ensure all people with a terminal or life limiting illness, and their family and whānau, have equitable access to quality palliative care, provided in a timely way, wherever they are living.

More and more older people are cared for at the end of their lives in Residential Care Facilities. They may have previously lived at home, or been transferred from hospital or our hospice.

We continue to develop a strong network of relationships with the medical, nursing and care staff who work in residential care, and this is a platform for ongoing education and clinical support, advice and mentorship. Our Palliative Care Link Nurse Programme (PCLN) is an example of this partnership with staff in residential care, and our aim is to have at least one link nurse in each Residential Care Facility.

Te Omanga Hospice and local Residential Care Facilities joined together this year to run the biannual Changing Minds Conference. It was wonderful to see the community come together for an inspiring and successful day with a real focus on connecting the links for an improved palliative care experience.

Our ongoing strategy and vision is that all older people living in Residential Care Facilities have access to good palliative care, and staff working in this area have confidence, knowledge and support to provide this.

CONSULTANCY SERVICE AT HUTT HOSPITAL

For over ten years, Te Omanga's team based at Hutt Hospital have ensured those who need specialist palliative care and support in hospital, have access to it. It is part of delivering on our vision that everyone with palliative care needs in our community receives responsive, proactive and equitable care.

Our Hospital Palliative Care Team includes a Palliative Care Physician and two Palliative Care Clinical Nurse Specialists, who work directly with hospital inpatients, and work on improving the palliative care skills throughout the hospital. Education plays an important role, with regular formal education sessions held with doctors and nurses at the hospital. Patients are referred from any department in the hospital so the team endeavour to have strong links with all professional disciplines.

A recent achievement has been the implementation of the end-of-life care document 'Te Ara Whakapiri' throughout the hospital. A successful initiative which has been in place for a few years is the palliative heart failure clinic. The clinic is run in conjunction with colleagues at the hospital and helps incorporate a palliative approach in the care of cardiology patients with advanced cardiac disease.

These initiatives are building on Te Omanga's focus to work collaboratively with other health professionals to achieve our vision.

FAMILY SUPPORT LEADING THE WAY

Te Omanga's dedicated Family Support Team provides emotional, spiritual, cultural, social and psychological support to people with a terminal or life limiting illness, and their families and whānau. We do this through a diverse range of services including art, music, occupational and touch therapy, counselling, social work, spiritual care, whānau support, bereavement care and biographies.

This year, our focus has been on:

- Empowering the voice of our patients and families to ensure they are heard and understood
- Ensuring a smoother transition for patients and families from one part of our service to the other
- Educating those we work closely with about Family Support's services and capabilities.

The Family Support Team continues to work in partnership with other health professionals, leading the way in working with Primary Care. Doctors can now refer patients and families directly to our Family Support Team for support at end of life, which meant this year 17 patients and families had access to support earlier, helping them face the challenges of living with a terminal or life limiting illness.

Networking, educating and supporting others who work in palliative care is an important part of our role. We gave 25 presentations over the year, including education sessions with Link Nurses and Primary Care Providers. We also participated in community events like Te Rā o te Raukura, hui, focus groups, and interdisciplinary team meetings at various medical centres.

As members of the Te Omanga Hospice Primary Care Liaison Team and in conjunction with Upper Hutt Medical Centre and Te Awakairangi, we received a Hutt Valley District Health Board Award in the "Excellence in Integration" category for our Palliative Care Patient Journey Project. A great recognition of our success in working with our partners.

It is only by working in partnership with our community, we can build a strong, supportive and compassionate community for people at the end of their life.

A COLOSSAL YEAR OF FUNDRAISING

In addition, this year we have raised 75% of the funds needed to rebuild our new hospice.

Fundraising initiatives and events such as our Annual Street Appeal, Farmers Trees of Remembrance, Ten Tables Christmas Tour and Vintners' Lunch were all well supported by our community, helping us reach our fundraising goals.

Vintners' Lunch continues to be a much anticipated event on the fundraising calendar. Guests enjoyed a six course degustation lunch created by some of Wellington's finest Chefs, along with matching fine wines. An incredible amount was raised for Te Omanga with an amazing show of support from guests, sponsors and local businesses.

A new fundraising initiative introduced this year was our 'Days of Care' programme. Many individuals and businesses have gifted a Day of Care to Te Omanga, helping provide much needed care and support to patients and their families for a specific day of the year. It's a wonderful way for people to honour someone's memory or celebrate a special day.

Our Hospice Shops in Petone, Lower Hutt and Upper Hutt continue to be an important source of funding for Te Omanga. As the level of awareness and concern for our environmental impact grows, so does the number of people recycling and repurposing goods by donating to and buying from our Hospice Shops.

This year Upper Hutt Hospice Shop tripled in size with the move to Queen Street. While it was sad to farewell our Main Street shop after 10 years, the new shop has better access for people to drop off their treasures and more room to present them for sale.

Our treasure box in Petone, Te Omanga Wakahuia Hospice Shop, has continued to grow with the team building strong relationships with the community. The shop recently received a generous donation of more than 160 gowns and accessories, hosting a fabulous Bridal and Ball Gown Evening attracting national media attention.

As part of our retail growth, we have trialled Pop-Up Hospice Shops in Wainuiomata and Lower Hutt, and continue to look for larger premises with better access within central Lower Hutt. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TE OMANGA HOSPICE TRUST AND TE OMANGA HOSPICE FOUNDATION

I have seen written that the "hospice movement" is the provision of specialist care, relief from pain, and emotional support for the terminally ill and their families. The first hospice in this sense appears to have been established in Lyon, France in 1842. Hospices in the UK were established in the late 19th and early 20th centuries by the Irish Sisters of Charity. The movement had a renaissance with the foundation of St Christopher's Hospice in 1967 by Dame Cicely Saunders. Most modern hospices are modelled on St Christopher's Hospice and that is so in New Zealand.

Te Omanga Hospice is at the forefront of the "hospice movement" in this country and while it has been acknowledged we must never lose sight of those behind Te Omanga's establishment – Max and Marion Cooper and Sir Roy and Lady McKenzie. Their legacy continues to inspire those who work for the provision of palliative care in the Hutt Valley community.

The challenges Te Omanga Hospice faces do not diminish. The understanding in medical terms of what a person with a terminal illness faces is increasing but the inevitability of death remains and that is where Te Omanga plays such a vital role in the lives of so many in this community.

The skill and dedication of the Te Omanga clinicians is impressive. They provide their care to those in need of it with professionalism and dignity. It is understated. It is there.

Our "temporary" home in Britannia Street is serving us well. The re-build in Woburn Road is progressing. Our new home will capture the tranquility of the old buildings which served us so well. The site is a gem and, thanks to the community, will remain our home well into the future.

The uncertainty we face is of course around funding. Cause and effect! The recent settlement between the District Health Boards and their nurses will have a flow on effect for hospices throughout the country. That is but one challenge.



The executive team so ably led by our Chief Executive, Biddy Harford, continue to deal with these ongoing issues as well as having to cope with the significant pressure of managing the financial commitments around the rebuild. They are a dedicated team and on behalf of the community I thank you all for your sterling work.

The trusteeship of The Te Omanga Hospice Foundation has been changed to reflect the purpose of the Foundation. There are now four Trustees two of whom are also Trustees of the Hospice Trust with the other two being appointed for their experience and knowledge in the investment industry. The Foundation has had a successful year because of the state of the investment markets but it requires constant attention. Graeme Talbot, a former chairman of Te Omanga, retired as a trustee at the end of last year and I wish to record my thanks to him for his many years of service.

I thank all the support staff for their dedication to Te Omanga. Our retail stores continue to go from strength to strength. The volunteers have no peer. Their dedication is quite extraordinary. The Trustees are aware they are all bursting to get back to Woburn Road. Their support in Britannia Street is outstanding.

I thank my fellow Trustees for their support, enthusiasm and commitment.

I am amazed at what we have achieved this year. Our earthquakeprone building has come down, the rebuild of our new hospice is underway, and despite the huge upheaval of moving to temporary premises, we have continued to deliver quality care and support to people in our community.

Our skilled multidisciplinary team continues to work in collaboration with other health professionals in the Hutt Valley to ensure that 'everyone with palliative care needs in our community receives responsive, proactive and equitable care'.

As we look ahead we know it will be more challenging to achieve our vision. The need for our services is growing along with the aging population. Our focus is on positioning our hospice to meet the future needs of our community.

We have been working with the Hutt Valley District Health Board to implement "Living Well, Dying Well: A Strategy for a Palliative Care Approach". This has led to a review of our model of care, which aims to achieve greater integration with Primary Care, Hutt Hospital and Aged Residential Care.


A pilot, commencing shortly, will see us work closer with GPs and their patients to support and strengthen palliative care in our community. It may mean Te Omanga is not always visible, but we'll be there standing behind others, providing specialist advice, support and education to those who need it, wherever they need it to ensure everyone receives the care they need.

This year we bid farewell to our beautiful old building at Woburn Road. While it was sad to see it go, it is exciting to see our purpose-built hospice take shape.

Building work for our new hospice is progressing well along with the campaign to fund this special legacy project. There is no Government funding available for capital projects; we are relying on the generosity of our community to raise the \$10 million needed and are incredibly grateful for the \$7.5 million raised to date.

Thank you for being part of our very special community of supporters who are making it possible for us to provide care and support to people when they need it most, not only today but tomorrow and for many years to come.






